As we produce advice for each site individually and thus, conservation objectives and targets for each designated feature for each site, there is no 'one advice package fits all approach'. Site Information Table that lists overlapping sites so users can view any overlapping MPAs. Also, within MAGIC maps, please use the site information tool ('i button) information is provided for any overlapping MPAs.

Natural England is facing significant budgetary pressures and as such, we are working on producing CA packages for our publication timelines, September 2018 and March 2019. Unfortunately, we are unable to action any changes to the Designated Sites System.

Questions from Mr Matthews (DoC): How long does it take from time of designation for advice/guidance to be available online?

ANSWER: Conservation advice is produced to underpin management of MPAs and to support authorities with a statutory responsibility. With agreement from Defra there are sites that will have updated Conservation Advice packages by Sep 2019, such as European Marine Sites, T1 and T2 Marine Conservation Zones. There may be local factors at Area Team level such as staff resource, higher priorities etc that may impinge on advice package production. Due to evidence gathering and verification surveys, advice packages are produced 1-1.5 years following designation/classification of a site.

NE – At time of change to status or designation, package guidance will be published online at time of next review cycle (usually March & October) but NE can provide it manually via email request. *The advice packages are 'live documents' and to allow for accessibility for users, we have two publication cycles per year; March and September. NE are unable to provide it manually upon request, but can inform users upon email request when a package is forecast to be produced (e.g. draft package) or updated (i.e. update from draft to formal package or update to the formal package with new evidence).*

What is the new NE charging regime – at what point are charges incurred for advice to developers?

NE – Statutory advice is not charged for; pre-consent advice is subject to charges.

ANSWER: We are working on a linking tool that links the pressures stemming from activities in the Advice on Operations to the features and attributes within the Supplementary advice on conservation objectives section. This tool goes beyond our statutory role and provides a time saving/cost element to users. We have keep you updated, however, it will not be ready till April 2019 at the earliest.

What is being done by NE with the mapping of recreational activities?

ANSWER: Natural England do map recreational activities, where the information is available, for example, for vulnerability

National Coordination & Marine Planning

a) National Steering Group

No further meetings of the **National Steering Group** (NSG) for Marine Protected Areas (MPAs) have taken place. The group is currently on pause and the MMO are currently working with Defra to review how each MPA group under the Defra family operates.

b) Marine Planning

Following the workshops held in March, the MMO is now analysing the responses and will be circulating a response very shortly.

They will then produce the third iteration which is expected in July or August. They are still on track to produce the third iteration in July – August of this year. The final Draft Plan is expected in Summer 2019.

Also, Alex Curd has replaced Neal Gray, as the MMO's Marine Officer for Marine Planning.

Delivery of Priorities 2018-19

Priorities are proposed as follows:

1. Stabilise funding for the future.

There are opportunities linked to delivering the mitigation plan for the Local Plans and these will be explored through the year.

2. Tamar Estuaries Management Plan

Creation of a new Tamar Estuaries Management Plan and adoption by all Relevant Authorities.

3. Support the exploration of feasibility of creating a National Marine Park.

Explore the opportunities post-Brexit and in particular the feasibility of creating a National Marine Park and how this could support the objectives of TECF.

4. Continue to host TECF, PPMLC and TOFF meetings.

5. Complete the Recreation Mitigation Plan and secure funding through an adopted Supplementary Planning Document.

The increased recreational pressures arising from the development brought forward through the Joint Local Plan and Cornwall Local Plan will need to have a mitigation plan agreed with a funding stream secured to deliver the actions.

6. Deliver the CIL EMS Project for 2016-2019

Work will continue delivering the Business Plan relating to the first phase of this project with the support of Beth Siddons. This includes monitoring, information provision, research and infrastructure.

7. Implement the Biosecurity Plan for the Tamar Estuaries.

The Plan has now been produced and will be implemented through training and workshops.

8. Carry out an Annual Survey of Relevant Authorities and use the findings to inform management practices and develop an annual boat survey of users.

10. Raise the profile of the work of TECF and the importance of the waters of Plymouth Sound and the Tamar Estuaries.

Ensure that there is a high profile for the waters, not just through our own channels of website and Twitter, but also supporting others to include marine messages.

MCZ Consultation

The third tranche of Marine Conservation Zones are now out for consultation. These will contribute to the Government's ecologically coherent network of sites around the coast. The first tranche of 27 MCZs was announced in 2013 and included the Tamar Estuaries and Looe and Whitsand Bays. A further 23 sites were added in 2016 and DEFRA are now consulting on 41 new sites and the addition of new features to 12 existing sites of which one is Looe and Whitsand Bay MCZ (the new features are moderate energy circalittoral rock, Giant goby and two species of Stalked jellyfish).

The nearest sites to us are the three south Devon Estuaries of the Dart Estuary, Devon Avon Estuary and Erme Estuary.

Joint Local Plan & EMS Recreational Mitigation

The Inspector has finished the examination of the Joint Local Plan and their findings are awaited.

Further limited consultation will be required of any modifications to the Plan as submitted, and these will take place later in the year.

EMS Recreational Mitigation

The work being undertaken to review the mitigation plan for the European Marine Site in order to inform the tariff that will be levied against new development is progressing. Ultimately this will need to be levied against all development within an identified 'zone of influence' of the Special Area of Conservation and Special Protection Area boundaries.

Actions are in the process of being agreed with Natural England under the following three themes;

- Projects and capital works
- Monitoring
- Wardening and Project Management

The evidence showed that mitigation should be required from all dwellings built within 12.3km of the boundaries of the EMS. This is a precautionary approach and is the zone from which 75% of coastal visitors live who visit the SAC. The zone for the SPA is slightly less, but in order to take a precautionary approach and to simplify the approach, a 12.3km zone of influence will be adopted for the EMS as a whole.

The package of mitigation measures comprise the following:

Projects and capital works

- Voluntary codes of conduct
- Provision of adequate litter receptacles
- Funding of marine litter clean ups.
- Awareness raising of sensitive habitats including the development of user-scale maps.
- 'Check, Clean, Dry' signage, leaflets, stickers.
- Educational workshops and roadshows.
- Implementation of Pollution Prevention Guidelines.
- Creation or screening of footpaths / boardwalks around sensitive areas.
- Reconfiguration of existing moorings if it would remove them from sensitive areas; Installation of eco-moorings or trot moorings.
- Provision of safe, designated launching points in less sensitive areas.

Monitoring

- Licensing and maintenance of GIS system for monitoring purposes.
- Recreational boat activity surveys.
- Recreational usage, activity and impacts survey

Wardening and Project Management

- Project Coordinator
- Estuary warden
- Project running costs

The approach now needs to be agreed with all four local authorities as well as the collection mechanisms. Further information will be provided once this has been done.

Annual Survey

The Annual Survey has been circulated to stakeholders for feedback. To date, we have received 6 responses out of the eleven requested. We would ask all members approached to complete the survey and have not responded yet, to do so before the end of July. The information helps us identify changes in activity levels, monitor the implementation of the TECF Management Plan and to collect headline indicator data that will help us monitor any long or short-term changes.

Water quality

The Bathing Water Quality warning emails from the Environment Agency started on 1st May and will run until 30th September. So far this season there has been one risk warning issued, at Plymouth Hoe East - Bathing was not advised, due to pollution from sewage. The incident started 30th May 2018 at 13:41, and ended 31st May 2018 at 08:33. Warnings are tweeted when received by @TamarEstuaries.

National Marine Park

On 6 June the Blue Marine Foundation, a national charity dedicated to creating marine reserves and establishing sustainable models of fishing, held a conference in Plymouth to explore the potential of creating Marine Parks and what these might look like. 130 people attended to hear presentations and to discuss how they might add additional benefits over and above the existing system of marine designations in England.

The new Labour administration for Plymouth has also pledged to support the campaign for Plymouth Sound to be designated the country's first National Marine Park.

A workshop is due to be held at the end of June hosted by Luke Pollard to discuss this further. A verbal update will be provided in the meeting.

Plastic Free Plymouth

Plymouth has launched a major new plan to tackle single use plastics and plastic pollution in Plymouth. The 'Plan for Plastics' was launched on Friday 8 June at the Dome, follows a week of action and is focussed on reducing the amount of plastic that ends up in the sea.

The Plan for Plastic focuses on a citywide drive to significantly reduce the use of single use plastics by 2020 and coupled with this will be a drive to encourage people to use the City's green and blue spaces.

The Plan will be driven, monitored and supported by Plymouth Britain's Ocean City Task Force and will include representatives from public bodies, environmental sector, voluntary sector, academia, industry and business.

The Plan is framed around four fundamental principles:

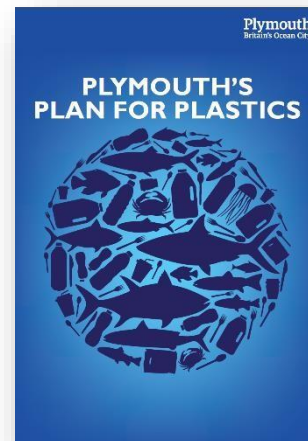
- Avoid – encouraging residents to avoid single use plastics, and to find alternatives such as reusable coffee cups;
- Recycle- continue to work to increase recycling rates in Plymouth;
- Innovate – support academic and industry led research into plastic free alternatives;
- Connect – developing an education programme to encourage people to visit and connect with the natural environment.

A detailed and fully costed Action Plan that sets out how each of the four principles will be taken forward is expected later in the year and will be produced by Plymouth Britain's Ocean City Task Force.

Also, Plymouth Waterfront has become the first UK city district to win accreditation with 'Plastic Free Communities' status issued by the charity 'Surfers Against Sewage'.

EMS CIL Managing Recreational Impacts Programme

Progress has been made with the following immediate deliverables;

- New website – www.plymouth-mpa.uk - due to launch by end of July.
- Quarterly newsletter – will launch shortly after website.
- Information Panels: 5 pilot panels – design completed, installation date TBC.
- The Plymouth Sound & Tamar Estuaries MPA video is being developed in partnership with Natural England. The video will be made available to partners once it is complete (due end July).
- The MBA have provided an initial Little Egret study, which brings together existing WeBS data with the results of the Recreation Study to identify potential hotspots for recreational impacts on the Little egret population in the Tamar SPA. A project brief is being developed to continue this work and survey the birds' activity and usage around the area.
- Fishing tackle bins have been sourced and the collection process is under discussion with PCC Street Scene and Waste department. The aim is to have these installed at key angling marks around Plymouth once collection can be agreed and signed created.

- **17/02323/FUL Harbour Arch Quay Sutton Harbour Plymouth PL4 0HN** - Erection of nine-storey building comprising 14 residential units and ground floor commercial unit for use as a shop (Class A1), or financial and professional services (Class A2), or a

restaurant or cafe (Class A3), or a crèche/day nursery (Class D1), cycle and refuse storage facilities and associated works. Information awaited

- **17/02068/S73 Drakes Island Plymouth** - Removal of condition 8 (long term Egret monitoring) from application 17/00336/FUL. Further information awaited.
- **18/00054/FUL Devonport Dockyard Saltash Road Keyham Plymouth PL1 4SG** - Temporary use of Table Top Mountain as a car park. **Decision made to grant conditionally.**
- **17/02324/FUL Land At Harbour Arch Quay Sutton Harbour Plymouth PL4 0HN** - Resurfacing of existing hard surface area. **Application withdrawn.**
- **17/02306/S73 Drakes Island Hoe Road Plymouth** - Remove condition 8 (long term Egret monitoring) and amend wording for conditions 7 (operational environmental management plan), 9 (design details), 10 (lighting details), 11 (external materials), 12 (landscape design and management plan), 14 (glazed acoustic screen), 18 (MOD explosives safeguarding), 19 (contaminated land), 23 (coastal erosion impacts) & 28 (Alderman Miller Memorial Garden) from application 17/00336/FUL
- **Vauxhall Quay Boardwalk with commercial units, Sutton Harbour:** This planning application was originally granted in 2015, but it has now lapsed resulting in this resubmission. The MMO license for the marine element was finally granted in December 2017.

Changes to Condition Assessment for subtidal seagrass

We are in the process of changing the recorded condition of subtidal seagrass in the SAC from favourable to unfavourable. This information was sent out by email in April:

We would like to inform you of a change we are making in our assessment of the condition of seagrass beds within Plymouth Sound and Estuaries SAC. Subtidal seagrass beds are now considered to be in 'unfavourable condition'.

Subtidal seagrass beds are a sub-feature of 'Large Shallow Inlets and Bays', 'Estuaries' and 'Sandbanks which are slightly covered with water at all times' within the SAC. The subtidal seagrass beds within this site were last surveyed in 2012, when the condition of this feature was described by the contractor as 'favourable'. In our 2016 condition assessment, the subtidal seagrass condition was subsequently assessed as 'favourable'. The 2012 survey was the first full assessment of the subtidal seagrass feature and can be considered a baseline survey. Due to survey limitations it was not possible to assess potential impacts from anchoring and mooring. Our 2016 condition assessment did not use proxy data, and therefore we did not do a vulnerability assessment as part of the assessment process.

Recently, particularly with our experience of undertaking vulnerability assessments for Marine Conservation Zones (sites for which little condition evidence was available and therefore assessments had to be made using activity data and habitat sensitivity), our approach to condition assessments has developed. We would now include a vulnerability assessment to address the lack of available evidence on potential anchoring and mooring impacts. Seagrass is known to be sensitive to physical disturbance and abrasion and anchoring and mooring has a medium to high risk of inducing this pressure (see our [Advice on Operations for the site](#)) and in some subtidal seagrass beds within the SAC anchoring and mooring is known to be of a high intensity. In a vulnerability assessment, a feature that is sensitive to a pressure (to which it is known to be exposed) would indicate a moderate to high vulnerability and a subsequent General Management Approach of 'recover' or 'restore' is applied.

Although the subtidal seagrass feature was previously assessed as being in favourable condition, there were some inherent uncertainties in the 2016 assessment and the contractor's assessment in 2012. Confidence in these assessments was low for the attribute 'number of plants per m²'. There was a decline in number of plants per m² between 2009 results and 2012 results but it was difficult to make comparisons and the assessment was made assuming an absence of anthropogenic impacts.

Relevant recent research

There have been some relevant recent studies that have investigated the effects of anchoring and mooring pressures on seagrass habitats. Unsworth *et al.* (2017) studied a range of sites in England where mooring occurs on seagrass (*Zostera marina*) and quantified the area of damage to seagrass caused by chain scour from swinging moorings. The authors found that the average area affected was 122 m² per individual swinging mooring. This study has also shown that loss of UK seagrass beds from boat moorings is 'small but significant at a local scale' and that this loss fragments existing meadows, 'ultimately reducing their resilience to other stressors'. We are aware of other stressors that may be impacting this feature; namely sediment surface contaminants, aqueous contaminants and invasive, non-native species, as well as significant disturbance from anchoring.

Griffiths *et al.* (2017) conducted a risk assessment of 173 sites in England and Wales and highlighted Plymouth Sound and Estuaries SAC as one of the SACs most at risk from anchoring and mooring pressures. They ranked the site 9th out of 173 for exposure to anchoring. The site was considered to be at risk, with designated habitats (namely seagrass beds) considered 'at high risk based on the worst case abrasion/disturbance pressure'.

In summary, the condition of subtidal seagrass beds within the site is now considered to be 'unfavourable' and therefore a conservation objective of 'restore to favourable condition' should be applied. **This instigates the requirement for management and we will be working with the relevant authorities to address what measures might be put in place to allow recovery of this feature.** It may also be necessary to subsequently revisit the condition assessments for the supporting habitat features.

Seagrass LIFE bid and preliminary work

Natural England has coordinated the submission of a concept note for EU LIFE funding for a 4 year project to work on restoration of seagrass habitats in 5 SACs including Plymouth Sound and Estuaries.

The project aims to protect seagrass from and reduce recreational pressures on seagrass beds; demonstrate large scale restoration and management techniques; promote awareness and inspire stakeholders to take better care of seagrass beds. There is a focus on resolving conflicts between marine conservation and marine users through face to face engagement work.

In this site we are proposing seagrass monitoring, the replacement of all legal moorings in Cawsand Bay with eco-friendly moorings, the addition of 10 visitor moorings to relieve anchoring pressure, an underwater clean up of old mooring blocks and a large amount of public awareness and engagement work.

There are a number of partners identified in the concept note including TECF, the National Marine Aquarium, the Royal Yachting Association and several academic institutions.

If the concept note is successful we will be asked to develop a full bid and will need to come back to TECF with more details. The concept note is available to any TECF member on request.

Separately but related work is our trialling of the 'helical screw' anchoring system for moorings in Cawsand Bay – these anchoring systems have a smaller 'footprint' than conventional mooring blocks and the trial will look at how effectively they work in a relatively open coast location.

Priority issues in the European Marine Site

Our work in this area has been prioritised largely based on our Condition Assessment of the Special Area of Conservation. With partners we have recently been working on some of the issues that are causing parts of the site to be considered in 'unfavourable condition':

- We have secured funding from the European Maritime and Fisheries Fund for a 2 year project working with South Devon AoNB and Cornwall Wildlife Trust to engage and train volunteers to manage and monitor the spread of Pacific oysters. This a particular issue in the Yealm estuary, but is likely to also start affecting other parts of the site. The project is just getting up and running and volunteer recruitment has started.
- Tamar biosecurity plan: last year this plan was developed with stakeholder input and has now been finalised. It is relevant to all water users in the Sound and estuaries and delivery is

ongoing and is being monitored through TECF. All NE marine monitoring has a specific target of recording invasive non-native species.

- Awareness raising about the marine environment is one of the key aims of our Tamar and Plymouth Focus Area. Last year we produced a film about the reefs of Wembury <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=91RXaQ3NZug> and would appreciate your help to share it. We are working jointly with TECF on a longer film about all the Marine Protected Areas around Plymouth.
- Working with the local authorities on the new local plans and in particular on developing mitigation lists for potential increases in disturbance from recreation within Plymouth Sound and Estuaries Special Area of Conservation and the Tamar Complex Special Protection Area.

Plymouth EMS and Tamar Estuary Sites MCZ Monitoring

Intertidal rocky shore monitoring 2016 – A report is available, please email for a copy.

Intertidal habitat mapping – This ‘biotope survey’ of all the intertidal areas of the SAC was carried out by Ecospan Environmental Ltd in September. This will update our existing habitat maps and the data will be available through the MAGIC mapping website <http://www.magic.gov.uk/magicmap.aspx>. The report has not yet been produced but is due later this year.

Subtidal reef survey – This survey focused on the deeper (circalittoral) areas of reef within the SAC and was carried out by Natural England’s monitoring team last year and has just been repeated this year with a view to comparing results and validating the methodology.

Allis shad and smelt surveys – Due to ongoing difficulties with access to survey sites we have been unable to monitor Allis shad spawning this year but we have had two reports of adult shad being seen in the upper Tamar. In February the Environment Agency carried out smelt spawning surveys on our behalf in the Tamar, smelt eggs were recorded over a larger area than previously. At that time we were also able to get high quality footage and photographs of smelt in the wild which will be useful for our awareness work.

Subtidal seagrass – The subtidal seagrass in the SAC I being monitored this summer by a combination of diving and drop down video (this aspect led by the Environment Agency). It will revisit the sites monitored in 2012 to allow comparisons.
